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

Message du président

Chers collègues membres de l'Académie internationale d'histoire de la pharmacie

Tout d'abord, j'espère que tous nos membres et leurs familles supportent les bouleversements actuels associés à la crise sanitaire mondiale du COVID-19 qui se poursuit malheureusement partout dans le monde, avec une intensité variable selon les régions, les périodes et les pays.

Comme je l'indiquais dans mon précédent éditorial, ce n'est pas la première crise sanitaire mondiale que nous vivons et sans doute pas la dernière. Et on peut espérer qu'à chacun de ces épisodes, on se souvienne des leçons tirées des précédentes et de l'histoire des crises antérieures, même si elles se présentent souvent sous un jour différent.

La vaccination a, en tout cas, été mise à l'honneur pour venir à bout de cette crise. Comme vous le savez, les Chinois pratiquaient déjà une vaccination contre la variole en frottant la peau des enfants avec des croûtes prélevées sur des malades atteints de la variole. Mais les prémisses de l'immunologie remontent à la fin du XVIII^e siècle avec les travaux de Jenner, mais surtout au XIX^e siècle avec les travaux de Louis Pasteur et le développement des vaccins. C'est le 6 juillet 1885 que Pasteur inocule au petit Meister la moëlle de lapin mort rabique, suivi de 12 autres injections. Cette injection d'un virus a rencontré à l'époque quelques oppositions du

corps médical. Et cette opposition reste encore très vivace dans certains pays, malgré tous les résultats évidents en faveur de la vaccination. « Aussi longtemps que la santé de l'homme est menacée, il y mêlera affectivité et rationalité »ⁱ.

Il faut aussi rappeler les travaux du Prix Nobel Charles Nicolle (1866-1936) montrant l'existence de « porteurs sains » capables de répandre les maladies sans en être eux-mêmes incommodés. Notre travail d'historien peut contribuer à montrer l'intérêt de la vaccination qui s'est développé non seulement en prévention mais aussi pour le traitement de certaines pathologies.

Il faut par ailleurs souligner la performance des équipes universitaires et industrielles qui, depuis un an, ont trouvé le moyen de découvrir, de développer et de produire en un temps record les vaccins contre la Covid-19, là où ces délais se comptaient habituellement en années. Il faut espérer que le plus grand nombre, et chacun d'entre vous et de vos proches, sera vacciné rapidement ! Il est intéressant de remarquer dans ce numéro de Communication que la production scientifique 2020 de nos membres de l'Académie est restée très élevée et riche en informations.

Enfin, même si notre prochaine réunion n'aura lieu qu'en septembre 2022, je vous encourage à proposer de nouveaux membres qui ont la qualité pour rejoindre notre Académie, dans le respect des règles de quota, prévues par pays.

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Message from the president

Dear colleagues, members of the International Academy of the History of Pharmacy

First of all, I hope that all our members and their families are coping with the current issues associated with the global health crisis of COVID-19, which unfortunately continues around the world, with varying degrees of intensity depending on the region, period and country.

As I indicated in my previous editorial, this is not the first global health crisis we have experienced and it will probably not be the last. And it is to be hoped that in each of these episodes, we will remember the lessons learned from previous ones and the history of previous crises, even if they often present themselves in a different light.

Vaccination has been placed firmly in the spotlight as the means to overcome this crisis. As you know, the Chinese previously practiced smallpox vaccination by rubbing the skin of children with scabs taken from smallpox patients. The beginnings of immunology date back to the end of the 18th century with the work of Jenner, and especially in the 19th century with the work of Louis Pasteur and the development of vaccines. It was on 6 July 1885 that Pasteur inoculated the child Meister with the marrow of a rabbit that had died of rabies, followed by 12 other injections. The injection of a live virus met with some opposition from the medical

profession at the time. And this opposition is still very much alive in some countries, despite all the obvious benefits in favour of vaccination. "As long as human health is threatened, it will mix affectivity and rationality"ⁱ.

We should also recall the work of Nobel Prize winner Charles Nicolle (1866-1936) showing the existence of "healthy carriers" capable of spreading diseases without being affected themselves. Our work as historians can help to illustrate the growth in knowledge about vaccination, which has developed not only as a means of prevention of disease but also as a treatment in certain others.

It is also necessary to highlight the performance of university and industry teams who, for the past year, have found a way to discover, develop and produce vaccines against Covid-19 in record time, when these processes are usually measured in years. It is to be hoped that the greatest number, and each one of you and your loved ones, will be vaccinated quickly ! It is interesting to note in this issue of Communication that the output of our Academy members during 2020 has remained very high and rich in information.

Finally, even if our next meeting will only take place in September 2022, I encourage you to propose new members who have reached the standard necessary to join our Academy, in accordance with the quotas specified for each country.

Obituaries / Nécrologies

Peter Homan (1938-2021)



The British Society for the History of Pharmacy is deeply saddened to announce the death of Peter Homan. Peter joined the Society in 1982 and served on its committee continuously from 1996, acting as its secretary from 1998 to 2018, and as its president from 2018-2020. From 1994 he volunteered for two days a week as an assistant at the Museum of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society, where he remained for 25 years. He showed large numbers of people around the museum and gave countless talks and demonstrations of the 'art and mystery' of the pharmacist.

Peter was also an active researcher and writer on the history of pharmacy, with a particular interest in the history of community pharmacy and in proprietary medicines. His articles were published in the *Pharmaceutical Journal* and in *Pharmaceutical Historian*. He produced a large number of information leaflets for the Royal Pharmaceutical Society's Museum, along with a video presentation *How Medicines were Made*, demonstrating historic dispensing techniques. He was the author with Briony Hudson and Raymond Rowe of *Popular Medicines: An Illustrated History* (2008) and contributed the chapter on community pharmacy history to *Making Medicines* (2005).

Peter was well known beyond the field of history of pharmacy. He was a long-standing member of the British Society for the History of Medicine, being on its committee for a number of years, and its president 2013-14. He was also well-known on the international stage, being a regular attender at the biennial Congresses of the International Society for the History of Pharmacy. He gave oral presentations, represented the British Society for the History of Pharmacy at their Extended Committee meetings, and frequently presented reports of the activities of the British Society for its Newsletter.

Peter's expertise, scholarship and international contribution to the history of pharmacy was recognised in his election in 2004 as a Member of our International Academy for the History of Pharmacy (*Communications* 46, December 2004, 449-451). In 2015 he was awarded the Leslie G. Mathews medal (a former member of the Academy) by the British Society for the History of Pharmacy in recognition of his original and scholarly work on the history of British pharmacy. He was also a Yeoman of the Worshipful Society of Apothecaries, and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society for distinction in the history of pharmacy.

Peter will be missed by a great many people in many different ways. He loved his role as a museum volunteer, which allowed him to continuously grow his knowledge about pharmacy past and present. He blossomed in this role and revelled in sharing his knowledge of the subject with both pharmacy and lay audiences. He was an outstanding people person and treasured all forms of personal interaction. A great many people's lives were touched by him. With his vast store of knowledge and as a hugely inspirational figure, his passing is a huge loss to the history of pharmacy, both in Britain and internationally.

His prescription for life was to live it to the full, a prescription he dispensed with infectious enthusiasm. He was an unwavering supporter of the British Society for the History of Pharmacy annual conferences, and the 2021 online conference, which occurred just a few days after his death, was dedicated to his memory. He will be sorely missed.

Barbara Kuźnicka (7 June, 1931 – 15 January, 2021)



On behalf of Polish pharmacy historians, I am sad to report that Prof. Barbara Kuźnicka died on Januray 15, 2021, in Warsaw. She was an outstanding Polish historian of pharmacy and, since 1983, member of the International Academy of Pharmacy History.

Prof. Kuźnicka was born in Łódź as the daughter of Prof. Robert Rembieliński, the owner of a pharmacy who, after its nationalization, raised the history of pharmacy in Poland to the university level, establishing and running the first and only Department of Pharmacy History at the Medical Academy in Łódź.

Graduated from pharmaceutical studies in her hometown, Barbara Kuźnicka moved to Warsaw and took a job at the Institute for the History of Science of the Polish Academy of Sciences for a long time. In 1986-1996, Kuźnicka headed its Unit of the History of Pharmacy, and in the following years, the Department of History of Biological Sciences and Pharmacy.

Prof. Kuźnicka introduced the issues of ethnopharmacy into the history of pharmacy in Poland. She was interested in modern interpretations of traditional herbalism, the relationship between botany and pharmacy, and the evolution of pharmacy teaching. She helped her father to update the second edition of his textbook of pharmacy history.

She edited the series "Studia i Materiały z Historii Nauki Polskiej. Seria B" (Studies and Materials from the History of Polish Science. Series B) and "Historia leków naturalnych" (History of Natural Medicines). She was an editor of the Polish journal "Quarterly History of Science and Technology" and lecturer in pharmacy history at the Medical Academy in Warsaw. She promoted five Ph.D. students in the history of pharmacy.

She was a member of the International Society for the History of Pharmacy and the Committee on the History of Science and Technology of the Polish Academy of Sciences, moreover, a correspondent member of Arbeitsgemeinschaft Ethno-medizin. For several years, Prof. Kuźnicka was vice-president of the Polish Society for the History of Medicine and Pharmacy.

France

Comme beaucoup de sociétés, la Société d'histoire de la Pharmacie a réduit considérablement ses activités durant cette année 2020 depuis le mois de mars. Un certain nombre de manifestations ont dû être annulées ou reportées. Nous avons cependant pu tenir notre réunion commémorative sur la découverte de la quinine par Pelletier et Caventou en 1820. Nous tenons toujours nos séances par viso-conférences depuis plusieurs mois, ce qui nous a permis d'inviter des membres étrangers à nos séances. Notre site Internet <http://www.shp-asso.org/> est d'autant plus utile. Le professeur Olivier Lafont, président de notre société française d'histoire de la pharmacie a souhaité cesser ses fonctions. Le nouveau président, Bruno Bonnemain, a été élu en mars 2021, Olivier Lafont étant, quant à lui, élu président d'Honneur.

Like many societies, the French society of history of pharmacy (Société d'histoire de la Pharmacie) has significantly reduced its activities during the year 2020 since March. A number of events had to be cancelled or postponed. However, we were able to hold our commemorative meeting on the discovery of quinine by Pelletier and Caventou in 1820. We have been holding our meetings by videoconference for several months now, which has allowed us to invite foreign members to be part of our sessions. Our website <http://www.shp-asso.org/> is all the more useful. Professor Olivier Lafont, President of our French Society of History of Pharmacy, has decided to retire. The new president, Bruno Bonnemain, was elected in March 2021, while Olivier Lafont was elected Honorary President of our society.

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Scientific Report for 2020, written in March 2021

According to our report published in October 2020, this calendar year has been atypical, due to restrictions imposed by the authorities at national and international levels.

On December 2, 2020, the Annual General Assembly was convened (Address No. 813 / 2.12.2020), *on-line*, for the presentation and approval of the activity reports for year 2019, postponed Monday, December 14, 2020, at 1 p.m., giving 10 minutes to each speaker.

Minute state: „Annual General Assembly - concluded today, December 14, 2020, rescheduling of the General Assembly of March 28, 2020. The meeting takes place online with the

participation of the president, treasurer, censors, cashier, secretary of the Bucharest branch and branch presidents: Bucharest, Cluj-Napoca, Iași, Oradea, Sibiu, Brăila, representing over 200 contributing members. The meeting is declared open by the President of SRHP, Prof. Dr. Adriana-Elena Tăerel, with a moment of silence In Memoriam, for two former Honorary Members of SRHP: Dr. Farm. Graziella Lygia Narcisa Baicu (1922-2020); Prof. Dr. Docent Dumitru Dobrescu (1927-2020).

The reports are presented according to the announced agenda of the General Assembly. President of SRHP- A.-El. Tăerel, presents the first report. The Presidents of the SRHP branches followed: Sibiu-Conf. Dr. Ladislau Rosenberg, Bucharest Department - First Pharmacist. Maria-Gabriela Suliman, Cluj-Napoca branch - Associate Professor Dr. Pharmacist Daniela Benedec, Iași branch - Associate Professor Dr. Pharmacist Luminița Agoroaei, Oradea Branch - Dr. Pharmacist Bianca Pașca, Brăila branch - Pharmacist Bogdan Toader. The reports on the economic activity of SRHP are presented, -financial activity, -proposals for the Budget, by: President, Prof. Dr. A.-El. Tăerel, - Treasurer Prof. Dr. Valentina Soroceanu. At the end, the Censor Report is presented by Dr. biol. Crișan Iuliana, regarding the financial situation of SRHP during the analyzed period. After comments and proposals on these reports, the vote of the General Assembly was requested for their approval. The reports were approved unanimously. The president declared the work of the General Assembly closed after about two hours. The scientific activity and proposals for the future from the SRHP Branches are mentioned as follows: Sibiu branch proposes - organization of the Symposium "Natural Therapies today", A Collaboration Project with other organizations in the history of pharmacy, Contributions as organizer to national meetings, annual SRHP, obtaining of Expert Certificates - on History of Pharmacy - Ana Maria Păpureanu and Ladislau Rosenberg.

The other branches proposed the future objectives: - participation with papers in specialized scientific events,

Congresses, symposia such as the "Symposium of Natural Therapies today", the Annual National Meeting of SRHP, etc .; - teaching courses of Pharmacy History, support and guidance for students works, respectively, continuation of works with similar topics on graduation license, printing works in brochures; guiding the students works for: Scholarship of Excellence „Conf. Dr. Pharmacist Zisi St. Fârșirotu ", in Bucharest; „Scholarship Prof. Dr. Doc. Marțian Cotrău ", in Iași; Oradea branch proposes the same organizational and scientific objectives; in addition, the election of the new Committee of the Section, the support for the new Museum of Pharmacy History, established in Oradea.

During online General Assembly, rescheduled for December 14, 2020 (initially announced for March 28, 2020), the main objective was to analyze the organizational, economic and scientific activity of the Society for the History of Pharmacy in 2019. We mention the XXVIII National Meeting of History of Pharmacy organized by SRHP, in Sibiu, on October 3-5, 2019, under the auspices of the University of Medicine and Pharmacy „Carol Davila" in Bucharest and the University „Lucian Blaga" in Sibiu, Faculty of Medicine, Department of Pharmacy. The organizing partner was the College of Pharmacists from Sibiu County. Some SRHP members participated with papers in the following scientific events: International Congress of Pharmacy History (Washington), National Meeting History of Medicine (Vaslui-Romania), CRIFST Sessions (Bucharest, Romanian Academy), AMFOR Sessions (National Military Circle-Bucharest). These institutions are listed in the papers published by us and reported to COMMUNICATIONS in April and October 2020.

Selon notre rapport publié en octobre 2020, cette année a été atypique, en raison des restrictions imposées par les autorités aux niveaux national et international.

Le 2 décembre 2020, l'Assemblée générale annuelle a été convoquée (l'Adresse n° 813 / le 2 décembre 2020), *en ligne*, pour la présentation et l'approbation des rapports d'activités pour l'an 2019, reportés, le lundi 14 décembre 2020, à 13 heures, selon le procès-verbal.

Procès-verbal: „Assemblée générale annuelle - conclue aujourd'hui le 14 décembre 2020, reprogrammation de l'Assemblée générale du 28 mars 2020. Cette Assemblée générale annuelle, se déroule *en ligne* avec la participation du président, - trésorier, -censeurs, -caissier, -secrétaire de la section de Bucarest et les présidents des sections: Bucarest, Cluj-Napoca, Iași, Oradea, Sibiu, Brăila, représentant plus de 200 membres contributeurs.

L'Assemblée générale est déclarée ouverte par le Président de la SRHP, Prof. Dr. Adriana-Elena Tăerel, avec une minute de silence *In Memoriam*, pour deux anciens membres d'Honneur de la SRHP: Dr. Farm. Graziella-Lygia-Narcisa Baicu (1922-2020); Professeur Dr. Docent Dumitru Dobrescu (1927-2020).

Les rapports sont présentés conformément au programme annoncé de l'Assemblée générale. Président de SRHP- A.-El. Tăerel, présente le premier rapport. Ont suivi les présidents des sections de la SRHP: la Section de Sibiu -Conf. Dr Ladislau Rosenberg, Bucarest - Pharmacienne principale Maria-Gabriela

Suliman, Cluj-Napoca - Professeur Associé Dr. Pharmacienne Daniela Benedec, Iași - Professeur Associé Dr Pharmacienne Luminîța Agoroaei, Oradea – Dr. Pharmacienne Bianca Pașca, Brăila - Pharmacien Bogdan Toader. Les rapports sur l'activité économique de la SRHP, -activité financière, -propositions de budget, sont été présentés par: le Président, Prof. Dr. A.-El. Tăerel et le Trésorier Prof. Dr. Valentina Soroceanu. Le dernier a été le Rapport de Censurer, présenté par le Dr. Biol. Iuliana Crișan, concernant la situation financière de la SRHP au cours de la période analysée.

On suite des commentaires et propositions sur ces rapports. Le vote de l'Assemblée générale a été demandé pour leur approbation. Les rapports ont été approuvés à l'unanimité. Le Président a déclaré les travaux de l'Assemblée générale clos après environ deux heures.

Dr. Pharm. Ladislau Rosenberg.

Les autres sections proposent les objectifs suivants: - participation par des communications aux événements scientifiques spécialisés, des congrès, -symposiums tels que le «Symposium sur les thérapies naturelles aujourd'hui», aux Réunion Nationale Annuelle de la SRHP, etc. -appui aux cours d'Histoire de la pharmacie, accorder un soutien et l'orientation des travaux réalisés par les étudiants, respectivement, poursuite des travaux avec des sujets similaires à la licence, impression des travaux en brochures; de guider les travaux réalisés par les

Marțian Cotrău” à Iași (Iassy); La section Oradea propose les mêmes objectifs organisationnels et scientifiques; en outre, cette Section propose l'élection du nouveau Comité de la Section et le soutien du nouveau Musée d'Histoire de la Pharmacie, établi à Oradea.

Lors de l'Assemblée générale *en ligne* reportée au 14 décembre 2020 (initialement annoncée pour le 28 mars 2020), l'objectif principal était d'analyser l'activité organisationnelle, économique et scientifique de la Société d'Histoire de la Pharmacie en 2019. Nous mentionnons la XXVIIIe National Réunion d'Histoire de la Pharmacie organisée par SRHP, à Sibiu, du 3 au 5 octobre 2019, sous les auspices de l'Université de Médecine et de Pharmacie „Carol Davila” de Bucarest et de l'Université „Lucian Blaga” de Sibiu, Faculté de Médecine, Département de Pharmacie. Le partenaire organisateur était le Collège des Pharmaciens du Comté de Sibiu.

AIHP's Board of Directors has awarded the 2020 AIHP Robert P. Fischelis Award to Robert Buerki, PhD, RPh, for his extraordinary contributions to the Institute and the field of pharmacy history. Dr. Buerki, who has been an AIHP member for more than 55 years, has served the Institute in numerous leadership positions, including President and Secretary.

The AIHP Robert P. Fischelis Award is conferred by AIHP's Board of Directors to persons or organizations that have had an important impact on the field of the history of pharmacy or on the well-being of the Institute. The award is given in honor of the late Robert P. Fischelis, a gifted leader of the pharmacy profession and a generous benefactor of the Institute.

In awarding the Fischelis Award to Dr. Buerki, AIHP's Board of Directors cited the key role he played in the creation of the George Urdang Chair in the History of Pharmacy at the University of Wisconsin–Madison School of Pharmacy, AIHP's host institution. That endowed chair is currently held by AIHP's Historical Director, Lucas Richert, PhD, who is also an Associate Professor at the UW–Madison School of Pharmacy.

Many individuals and organizations contributed to the campaign to raise the funds to endow the professorship, but according to former

AIHP Executive Director Gregory Higby, PhD, it was "an extraordinarily generous gift from Bob Buerki and his wonderful wife, Leslie" that enabled the campaign to finally reach its goal.

Dr. Buerki's financial support for the field of pharmacy history did not end with the creation of the Urdang Chair. He and his wife subsequently made another significant gift to the UW–Madison School of Pharmacy to create the Robert and Leslie Buerki Graduate Fellowship Fund, which provides fellowship support to graduate students in the School of Pharmacy interested in the field of (See details here: <https://aihp.org/buerki-2020-fischelis-award/>).



AIHP is pleased to announce that Professor Michael A. Flannery has received the 2020 Sonnedecker Prize for his article, "Government as Apothecary: Civil War Pharmacy and the Common Good". The article was published in AIHP's journal, *Pharmacy in History* (vol. 61, no. 1-2)

The AIHP Glenn Sonnedecker Prize is awarded annually to recognize the best published article in a peer-reviewed publication during the preceding year on the history of some facet of pharmacy practice or pharmacy education in the United States.

"Government as Apothecary" examines how the operation during the Civil War of two US government laboratories (the Army laboratory in Philadelphia and the Naval laboratory in Brooklyn)

influenced large-scale pharmaceutical manufacturing in subsequent decades. AIHP's Awards Committee cited the article for its "sophisticated... approach to historiography..., [an] impressive command of the sources and a convincing and novel set of arguments about the origins of the American pharmaceutical industry as well as impacts on pharmacy practice."

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
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

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
